Guide to walking Hallin Fell

Summary: A short but intense walk up Hallin Fell which provides an excellent viewing platform for Ullswater and its surrounding hills. Hallin and the surrounding area are a great base for exploring the lake a little bit. Bring a picnic and a camera!

Starting point: We recommend starting this walk at St Peter's Church. Ideally getting the steamer to Howtown and walking up the winding road, or driving there (you can park at the church).

From the church you follow the road back towards the lake slightly, until you see a track leading up the hill to the left. From the church you should be able to see the path all the way up.

As you head up there are some steeper bits which might be a good chance to pause for breath and take in the scenery. Behind you is Martindale, to your right you can see Barton Fell and Arthur's Pike up on the top.

The end: You will be on the lookout for a stone cairn (pile of stones) approximately 8-9 foot tall (it used to be even taller!). This pile of stones signifies that you've ascended Hallin Fell.

Well done!

What next?: We would advise getting a few snaps whilst up on Hallin, as you get stunning views of Ullswater, and the bend in it is clearly visible. This makes a great place for your picnic, as you can sit and soak in the beauty.

If you feel full of energy and want to do more, head back down the hill to where the path forks (near the starting point at the church). Here you can opt to go around Hallin Fell by following the path heading towards Ullswater. This walk will take you along the lake shore (eventually) and through some woods. It is a staff favourite because it offers so much variety.
